From the desk of Father Baier...

You will notice that the vestibule carpet has been changed. The old frayed carpet has been replaced with a carpet that matches but that is slightly different. This was a project that Mary Ellen Wolf insisted on doing even giving instructions to her family as she was dying about how to ensure this was brought to completion. Mary Ellen and Phil funded the project and saw the need for it. I give thanks to them both for this new entryway.

Change can be very difficult for us, and yet to be human is to change. Those of us who are adults no longer think as children, although we can retain the child-like character that Jesus encourages. For us as a community it is difficult to adjust to a Saint Paul that doesn't have Mary Ellen Wolf here among us. Change is hard. Yet, Saint John Henry Newman once wrote "To live is to change, and to be perfect is to have changed often." This coincides with the idea of repentance or metanoia. Repentance is the act of changing to be more attuned to God, to be more like God. It is a surrender of ourself to the ways of God. To repent is not something that we do only once in our lives or when we have serious sin that we encounter. No. Repentance is something that we do daily to be more attuned to the God who loves us. Life isn't meant to be lived our way, but God's way. This is why we say in the Lord's prayer, "thy will be done". When we learn we change. When we correct our mistakes we change. When we pray we change. When we enter into true friendship we are changed. When we come to Mass with open hearts we are changed. Even the act of communion is about receiving Jesus into ourselves and allowing ourselves to become more like him.
